He joined Stillwater in 1975 and played with them until the group folded in 1983 – and even after that in the famous Stillwater annual reunions.

Rob retired from the U.S. Air Force as a Master Sergeant in April of this year after 26 years in the blue suit. During his career he traveled to several locations around the world to entertain blue suiters in Europe, Iraq and Afghanistan.

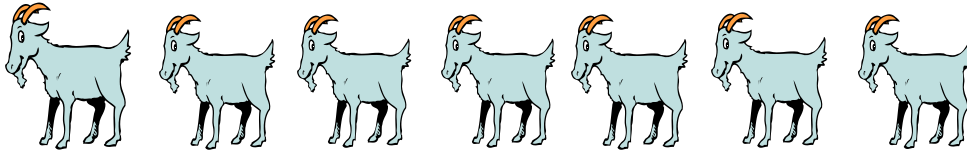
## CTR GIVES TO BREAST FRIENDS FOREVER

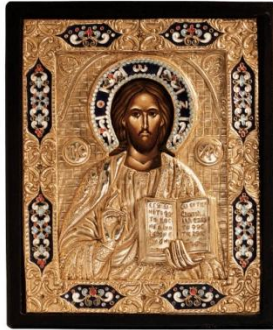
**Prayer for our Mission Churches:**

## VALUES AND ETHICS – FROM CULTURE – OR THE GOSPEL?

Not too long ago, most parents trusted that the values and ethics for leading “the good life” were clear to their children. They trusted that young people would learn the most important lessons through the cooperative moral agreement that appeared to be a part of a broad social contract. They trusted that the details of denominational belief could be learned at Sunday school, and that the full engagement of life would bring about formation of the soul.

Today, many act as if the same arrangement exists. The connection between what our young people learn from surrounding culture and what they learn from the gospel has changed. The word of God is always alive and active in the world, but the capacity to discern it has faded to an all-time low, not just in our society but also in the church. We have to ask ourselves: in our hyper-connected, media-dominated culture, how will the soul be formed – what will it look like?



One of our responsibilities to God is to pass on knowledge of the sacred. Though faith is a path that each of us must choose, it is a sacred communal aspect of the command and gift we call love.

When Jesus called Peter to the task of sharing his faith, to live for others, he asked, “Do you love me?” Like Peter, we may be surprised to find our responsibilities to others begin with intense self-evaluation. Do you love Jesus? Do you love God? What is truly important to you? What is your ultimate commitment?

The society in which we now live demands a renewed commitment to the sacred trust that compels us to share our spiritual knowledge and traditions with each other and with the generations to come. This is clearly one of our most urgent tasks as a community. It begins by a fearless searching of our individual hearts.

## ***TURKEY SHOOT TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 5<sup>TH</sup> AND 12<sup>TH</sup>***

Travis Kay has set up a first-ever Turkey Shoot fundraising event on two Saturdays in November. The event will be held in the back of the church property where the shoot can safely be held. Here's how Travis explains the shoot:

The shooting area will be set up at the gate next to the Barn. Six target posts will be set up 50 feet from the shooters, directly in front of the shooting area. The posts will be 5 or 6 feet apart (side by side). Targets will be white paper plates, with a cross drawn in the center. The plates will be numbered 1-12 on the back side. Shooters will purchase one target or more and write their name on the

back. The first 6 targets will be attached to the target post. Shooters will fire from the shooting area at their target. A 12 or 20 gauge shotgun will be provided. Shells will also be provided. S

Shooters may use their own shotgun provided they fall within our rules:

- Rule #1—Must be 12 or 20 gauge
- Rule #2—Must be an open choke
- Rule #3—Barrel cannot be longer than 30 inches
- Rule #4—Shooter must use our shells

After all 12 shooters have shot, the plates will be checked. The closest shot hole to the cross intersection wins a frozen turkey for Thanksgiving! At this time, prices for the targets have not been set, but will not be over \$4 a target.



## Treasures in the Barn Ministry

Since November 13, 2010, The Barn, as it is affectionately called, has welcomed people from all walks of life. The people who work there have helped the poor, consoled those who mourn, talked to the lonely and or assisted happy shoppers. On Thursdays, Fridays or Saturdays, one of these folks will be greeting you; Linda Thompson, Travis Kay, Ken Cooper, Bertha Wright, Bunny Nobles, Terry Rogers, Kathy Dubiel, Andrea Selby or myself. Others fill in when needed; Laurie Alexander, Cyrena Pritchett, Mary Hodgkins, Dotty Cox and Linda Gerlock. Volunteers can work one hour or all day. Stand-bys are always needed as well as regular workers. If you can spare some time, we welcome you!

From October 30, 2010 to June 19, 2011, we have taken in \$10,456.03. Of that amount, we have reimbursed CTR Building Fund \$3,000.00. The Building Fund was used to remodel the barn. Once that has been repaid, we will divide the proceeds between outreach programs and the Building Fund. The Barn also pays its own electrical bills and any expenses such as sale books, scotch tape, tickets, shelves, etc.

We are very grateful for all donations. Without them, the Barn would not exist. Anyone can make a donation and it is tax deductible. The over flow of items, which happens from time to time, is shared with the Salvation Army. Boxes are recycled.

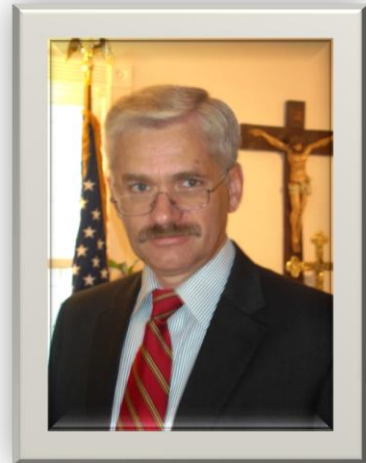

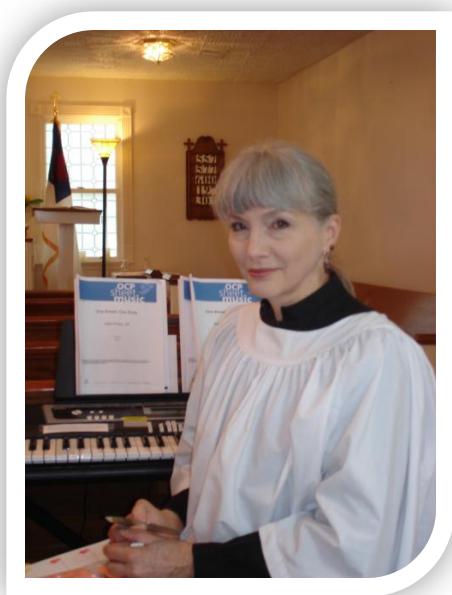
## JERRY HERBEL APPOINTED TO CHRIST THE REDMEEMER VESTRY

**Jerry Herbel** has been appointed to serve on the Vestry. Jerry is assistant professor of political science and public administration at Georgia College & State University in Milledgeville. He teaches courses on political philosophy, public management, ethics and literature. He has an article forthcoming in the journal *Public Integrity* on ethical leadership in Shakespeare's *Henry V*. In 2010, Herbel retired as an Air Force officer after 25 years of active duty and reserve service in public affairs and recruiting. His last assignment was as reserve assistant to the deputy director of public affairs, U.S. Air Force Headquarters in the Pentagon.



Herbel has attended Christ the Redeemer since 2009. He was a member of All Saints Episcopal Church from 1998-2009 where he served as warden of the lay Eucharistic ministers (2001-2004), vestryman, (2004-2006) and chairman of the rector search committee (2006-2007).

Herbel and his wife Angie have lived in Warner Robins for 13 years and have three sons: Chris, Jason and Stephan. Angie teaches in the FOCUS program for gifted students at Northside Elementary.
